5 THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

St. Therese of Lisieux

- 1 Born on Jan. 2, 1873, she was named Marie Françoise-Thérèse Martin.
- 2 Thérèse experienced a childhood call to religious life and entered Lisieux's Carmelite monastery at age 15. Her five sisters all joined religious orders.
- 3 Thérèse received the religious name of Thérèse of the Child Jesus and the Holy Face.
- 4 Her older sister, Pauline, became prioress of the same monastery. Recognizing her sister's spiritual gifts, Pauline told Thérèse to write down her spiritual memoirs. These were published after Thérèse's death (Sept. 30, 1897) as "The Story of a Soul."
- 5 Thérèse's advice on trusting and loving Jesus became known as "the Little Way." The "Little Flower" was canonized in 1925. Her feast is Oct. 1.

You may also remember that, on March 19, 2020, here in the Diocese of Green Bay, we began a year dedicated to St. Joseph. Before our diocesan Year of St. Joseph concluded, Pope Francis declared that 2021 would also be dedicated to St. Joseph as we recognize the 150th anniversary of his being named patron of the universal church.

Over the past 18 months, then, we have prayed our diocesan Prayer to St. Joseph. Among the intentions of this prayer is a request to St. Joseph for his assistance with vocations:

"With Mary, you raised Jesus the High Priest.
"You know our need for priests.

"Please raise up good and holy priests from our families to serve the people of our diocese.

"May our children and grandchildren hear and say 'yes' to the call of Jesus, just as you and Mary did."

Has St. Joseph ever been at work in this last school year! Last year, five young men entered our new pre-seminary studies year in the diocese. They lived at the Holy Name of Jesus House of Formation at the former convent at St. Matthew Church in Allouez. During this "Kairos Year," these young men spent time praying and living in community, learning to listen and respond to God's call for them. I am pleased to report that all five of those men have decided to move forward and apply to the seminary. They have all been accepted and are now beginning their studies in the next few days! In addition, this year another seven young men are beginning their Kairos Year.

I have noticed over the years that St. Joseph always answers prayers so quietly and so completely that he often goes beyond our expectations. Since all of you started praying for an increase in "yesses" to the vocation to the priesthood, through the intercession of St. Joseph, a little over a year and a half ago, 12 young men are now engaged in seminary and pre-seminary studies, leaving us with a total of 17 men in formation! These men were not here before we started the prayer!

Message from Fr. Quinn

Praise the Lord!

Welcome to October! The month of Saint Terese of the Child Jesus, the Holy Guardian Angels, Saint Francis of Assisi, Our Lady of the Rosary, Saint Teresa of Jesus, Saint Luke, Saints John de Brebeuf, Isaac Jogues and Companions, and Saints Simon and Jude. Those are only to name the feasts and memorials are not optional! There are sixteen more optional memorials.

This past week brought with it a few highlights themselves. A special thank you for the Priesthood Sunday bulletin board prayer and quotation. That means a lot to me. I was grateful to celebrate the Priesthood with you all last week. The pastoral, finance, and maintenance meetings kicked into high gear with our third month. The cumulative effect of not having the meetings for such a long time made the growing curve exponential but manageable. With moving into the new role of parish administrator (being installed as pastor only comes after two years of service in the parish for the Diocese of Green Bay), there has been adaption by all to the transition. Some good news of communicating an upcoming gift to Saint Anthony's Parish of approximately \$26,000 as a beneficiary of a Trust was perhaps the best news! Last Sunday, I had the opportunity to share this good news at the beginning of homily during Mass. After three years of hearing about it, we finally have been blessed with the news that October should be a disbursement. It could not have come at a better time. Praise God for His providential care. He never abandons His children. Also shared the not so good news that we will have to come up with \$2,000-\$3,000 as we have a shortfall for the next couple of months. Please consider making a special extra donation to help offset this shortfall until we receive our significant contribution. A simple gift online can go a long way to moving us forward with a hopeful vision to the future.

During the homily last week, I shared that the rectory garage project was a job that needed to be done before the winter. The black mold is dangerous and the water leaking through the roof is ruining the building itself. Thank you to Sacred Heart and Saint Mary's for the extra help and especially to the trustees, Pat, Sue, Ed and Jim. In conjunction with the finance council, our volunteer business manager and accountant, the decision had to be made to move before winter sets in. The positive side of the project of course, is not only the fixing of the garage structure, but the good stewardship that it involves. Thank you!

We have been given a responsibility to cooperate with who God created us to be, "...God made them male and female..." we hear Jesus say today. Man's role in the plan of creation is to, "leave his father and mother and become one flesh with woman." Man, then, in the anthropology of the human species as an embodied spirit is destined to initiate, to make the move, and ultimately decide. In effect, to propose. Man's role in the stewardship of creation given to him then (in an authentic Christian Catholic anthropology) is meant to be an agent of initiation and change. Change is difficult but a necessary component of survival. In carefully discernment, man's responsibility is then the two-fold task of cultivating and subduing God's creation through stewardship. This often entails the difficult decisions of providing, protecting and empowering. Today, the anthropology of not just man is under attack, but femininity as well. *Transhumanism* is the avatar of a new movement trying to destabilize and destroy God's initial plan, "[making] them male and female. Family is being attacked and parish family as an extension of family (the domestic church) can be vulnerable too. We can make a conscious effort to respect the inherent dignity of man's origin as created in His image and likeness (Imago Dei) by praying together and discerning God's call in our lives. With that in mind, we will continue to worship Him truly in the way we live and pray.
